We commit to cultivating both by leveraging our power and reckoning with philanthropy's historical roots and present reality so that together we can pursue connection and wholeness.



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Welcome Letter

Dear Friends and Colleagues,

Across 2022 and 2023, the GEO community moved closer to realizing our shared vision of courageous grantmakers working in service of nonprofits and communities to create a just, connected and inclusive society where we can all thrive. These shifts in thought and practice – which do not happen overnight – require an ecosystem mindset, demand a commitment to cultivating collective genius and involve constant reimagining of the transformation that is *possible* for the philanthropic sector, not just what is practical or efficient.

These shifts were apparent at GEO's 2022 National Conference, our first in-person gathering since the pandemic. As communities face threatening conditions, it is critical to acknowledge that philanthropy is not always collectively committed to social progress. Yet, as we listened to workshops and engaged with practitioners from across the sector, it was clear that more grantmakers are challenging traditional beliefs about what is possible – a position of courage that is long overdue for our field. The GEO community is aware of the practices that have historically held back communities and, in forums such as GEO's National Conference, is coming together to establish a common understanding of our individual experiences.

2023 marked 25 years of our commitment to foundational practices of equitable grantmaking. While we continued the work of providing supportive and challenging spaces for grantmakers to grapple with pressing issues, we also made time for reflection and celebration. We went deep in our strategic planning process, which brought the benefit of even deeper connections with our members and broader community.

Over the last two years, the GEO staff helped to facilitate the safe return of in-person connections. GEO re-entered the field to deepen new and old relationships that, for too long, had been relegated to our computer screens. In Seattle, Washington, we reflected on how philanthropy-serving organizations had adapted during the pandemic to advance philanthropic culture and practice. In Grand Rapids, Michigan, we discussed how grantmakers can center communities in capacity-building efforts. From Arizona to Florida, Iowa to Indiana (and, of course, in the virtual panels and sessions that continue to expand access to all participants), we have tremendous gratitude for the opportunities to reconnect peers and host conversations on the issues that matter most for the GEO community.

In this report, you will see many examples that illustrate the ways GEO has continued to be a supportive, resource-rich space for grantmakers to advance social progress through transforming philanthropic culture and practice. We continue to extend our gratitude to the members, partners, supporters and staff who have committed their leadership through these two years. Though there is more work to be done, the prospect for an invigorated ecosystem for change is bright!

GEO in Action

Throughout 2022 and 2023, GEO was busy providing members with many ways to connect and collaborate with those on the same journey to improve. Over the course of two years, we engaged thousands of grantmakers virtually and in person. Here are some highlights:

- Peer Communities and Cohorts:
- Strategic Learners Network 30+ GEO members connected with peers to discuss learning and evaluation practices in philanthropy through quarterly calls, a Slack space and a listserv.
- Equitable Operations 50+ practitioners in operational functions engaged to explore pathways for creating and supporting peoplecentered culture.
- Capacity-Building Champions 20+ people engaged in this vibrant learning community of grantmakers who embrace grantee-centered capacity building as a strategy for building nonprofit resilience.
- Race Equity Culture Fellowship 13 racial equity and DEI leaders in grantmaking organizations joined this peer cohort program hosted in partnership with Equity In The Center[®].
- Change Leaders in Philanthropy Fellowship CLIPF continued to support executives as they lead organizational change and create conditions that lead to nonprofit success and sustainability. Across

2022 and 2023, CLIPF welcomed **41** fellows. This makes a total of **119** alumni who are part of the Change Leaders Community peer group.

- CEO and senior leadership convenings 76 organizational leaders came together to discuss shared experiences, innovative approaches and collective wisdom to effectively address systemic inequalities and drive impactful change within their organizations and the broader community.
- Webinars and Partner Calls: GEO worked with our members to host
 16 webinars and partner calls to explore emerging grantmaking topics and approaches, combining in-depth information and practical examples with thought-provoking discussions.
- **Remote Learning Series:** GEO offered **3** Remote Learning Series, which provided space for members to learn with seasoned practitioners within the GEO community across multiple sessions. Topics included community-driven philanthropy and the learning mindset.
- New-Member Orientations: We held quarterly new-member orientations each year for a total of **Six** opportunities for new members to connect and provide insight into how GEO can best serve their desired impact.
- GEOList: Each year led to 50 questions related to collective discussion, feedback and insights of member-led topics about equitable culture and practice in real time.

GEO Highlights

2022 and 2023 GEO Conferences: Moving Forward Together

Hosted in partnership with our regional partner, Forefront, GEO's 2022 National Conference marked the first time since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic that the GEO community gathered in person. It was a collective moment of celebratory reunion — for three days, 600 participants listened and collaborated to fill their cups and encourage each other to move forward, the ultimate expression of GEO's charge to transform philanthropic culture and practice *in community* with others.

The 2022 National Conference also served as a restatement of GEO's commitment to racial equity. Conference plenaries, workshops and short talks explored practical ways that grantmakers can support communities deeply affected by systems of oppression. The National Conference moved attendees closer to addressing the historic, emerging and dynamic forces at work that suppress individual and communal avenues to self-actualization.

Hosted in partnership with Philanthropy DMV (formerly Washington Regional Association of Grantmakers), our 2023 Learning Conference centered on the theme of courageous unlearning. The conference offered a range of perspectives and new ideas to go beyond the basics and support grantmakers in more intentional learning practices – both internal and external to their organizations – through a mix of session formats, speakers from inside and outside of philanthropy, and a virtual livestream component to engage conference participants both in person and virtually.





Across both conferences, speakers reminded us that the complexities of the human experience require us to expand our perspectives as well as our approaches to developing solutions in partnership with those most impacted by issues. Others offered concrete practices for funding place-based systems change and building power for people representing the global diaspora. As a field, we are aware of the practices that have historically held back communities, and, at GEO's 2022 National Conference and at our 2023 Learning Conference, the GEO community came together to establish a common understanding of our individual experiences. Through this process, we opened endless possibilities for nurturing and sustaining community, honoring difference and reckoning with power in ways that allow all to thrive.

show the benefits of this approach to the philanthropic sector. By offering updated analysis and case studies, we aim to support the sector in becoming more equitable and community-driven.



A CHANGE MANAGEMENT AND DEEP EQUITY PRIMER: THE WHAT, WHY, HOW & NUANCE (2023), BY SHERYL PETTY AT MOVEMENT TAPESTRIES

Co-released with Sheryl Petty at Movement Tapestries, this publication introduces dynamic practice leaders as well as an emerging body of work that promises to improve our effectiveness

as grantmakers, change agents, managers and organizational leaders. Organizations embarking on equity transformation processes often grapple with questions about the work they are engaging in and where they aspire to land as it relates to advancing change. These common questions can present moments of tension or stuckness, for organizations, staff, boards and equity practitioners, whether in identifying the greatest power levers or unaddressed challenges, or in navigating fear or misalignment that can impede larger transformation journeys. Through this publication, Petty supports systems to unstick and deepen their ability to advance and embody Deep Equity.
